


Appalachian Mountains are home to two native hemlocks






Eastern Hemlock (Tsuga Canadensis)

Carolina Hemlock (Tsuga carolinia)

Lives only in western North Carolina and a few counties in neighboring states.





Problem: Invasion of non-native Hemlock Wooly Adelgid Millions of hemlocks have already died.




- _ Most remaining will die in next two decades if adelgid left unchecked.
- _ Carolina Hemlock faces extinction due to small population.



Hemlock adelgid first detected in northern Virginia. Has now spread north to Maine and south to Georgia.







Solution: Restore ecological balance


Laricobius nigrinus "Lari" beetle. Discovered in hemlock groves of Pacific Northwest USA. Feeds only on adelgids.

Buncombe County's Role:

Save hemlocks on local public lands (county, municipal and schools).

Primary Strategy: Build up populations of Lari beetles to reduce adelgid populations to a level that hemlocks can survive.

- Will require a multi-year effort.
- Preserving endangered Carolina hemlocks and "wilderness" habitats is a priority.
- Protecting hemlocks in rural, suburban and urban areas is important, too.



Goals for 2015:

- Secure 5,000 Lari beetles from Pacific Northwest USA.
- Release Lari beetles to save best remaining population of native hemlocks.
- Prioritize saving our last remaining old growth Carolina hemlock groves.
- Budget = \$25,000 for 5,000 Lari beetles, transferred from Pacific region to Buncombe sites.
- Program Administration by WNC Communities.
- Volunteer support from Mountain True.

How citizens can help


- ▶ Help identify hemlocks that need to be preserved on parks, schools and other local public lands.
