Project Description*

Description of Project

The Western Women's Business Center (WWBC), a program of Carolina Small Business Development Fund (CSBDF), seeks to provide capital for new and existing small businesses in Buncombe County to promote economic development and employment. However, along with capital, we must provide training and technical assistance to ensure these businesses are successful. This proposal requests funding to support and expand training and TA programs geared towards artists, veterans and women in public housing.

Business Artists in Residence Program is a once a month technical assistance (TA) program. This program works with artists at the Asheville Area Arts Council and a program associate does on-site training. We also plan to provide business plan training by the middle of 2017. There are efforts to expand the program, as it has been successful.

Business Lending Seminar is an introduction of what the loan application process looks like and features the CSBDF loan products. Business Ready is a program we provide to women in public housing to make sure all barriers that they face in order to start a business are addressed.

Best Year Yet (BYY) is a strategic planning workshop that is kicked off in a 1 day event and continues for 12 months providing the client with 1 on 1 coaching and in a group form. Our first BYY was held in Sept. 2016 and our next one will start in Feb. 2017.

In October 2016, CSBDF launched a Latino Program for the state of NC. The Latino Program, in Spanish "Programa Empresarial Latino," is designed to provide capital, TA and business management tools to help Latino entrepreneurs and community overcome barriers in accessing capital. We have business coaches in Buncombe County to fulfil the needs of the Spanish-speaking Latino clients. The Latino program offers the same services that the WWBC offers in Spanish.

We also host QuickBooks workshops so that individuals can understand the financial health of their business and learn QuickBooks in a small group setting.

This project will serve a total of 150 people in Buncombe County through the Latino program, Business Readythough all of the proposed programs.

According to the 2010 Census, there are over 238,000 people in Buncombe County. Nearly 52% are women (nearly 124,000) and Latinos represent 6% (over 14,000). Veterans, Latinos and creative artists served will be a mix of men and women and we will focus on women in public housing. Creative artists and women in public housing typically live at or below the poverty level based on their limited income. All 4 groups can be found in various areas of Buncombe County. Creative artists will be reached through organizations like the Asheville Area Arts Council, women in public housing will be reaching through the Asheville Housing Authority and through NC Works in Buncombe County. Latino business owners are reached through referral partners including El Centro, Hola Carolina, Mountain BizWorks, Nuestro Centro, Asheville Savings Bank, Wells Fargo and SelfHelp. We focus on reducing barriers for entrepreneurs in LMI situations with an emphasis on minorities, veterans, women, artists and Latinos.

What key steps will you take to achieve the results of this project?*

The WWBC will continue to hold its monthly and bi-monthly workshops and will market all of its programs to the specific populations to spread awareness. The goal is to maintain the number of attendees at all of the events, reaching as many entrepreneurs in Buncombe County as possible. These classes are important because they are held on a regular schedule and have become a staple of the programs we offer, letting the community know what resources we can offer them.

Business Artists in Residence Program has monthly visits for one-on-one 30 minutes client intake. We are also teaming up with the Asheville Area Arts Council and Lofty Goals to host a monthly art gathering. This is a brainstorming and informational session about the services each entity offers and how we can support local art. The Latino Program will continue marketing and outreach to Latinos entrepreneurs in Buncombe County that need coaching and training to start or expand their businesses.

Approximately 1,600 clients have attended workshops and TA since the WWBC opening in FY2015. In FY2015, there were 500 which increased to 800 in FY16 and so far in FY17 300 clients have been served.

The presence of the WWBC has increased our loan volume in Buncombe County. In FY14, 2 loans totaling \$45,768 were made; in FY15, 10 were made totaling \$101,319 in Buncombe County. This number increased to 22 in FY2016 totaling \$61,607. This increase in loans made can be attributed to the classes, coaching and trainings done by the WWBC. So far in FY17, 3 loans have been made totaling \$90,333.

Since the Latino program launch, 3 loans have been made to existing business in Buncombe to Latinos, totaling \$76,000. Because of the loans, these small business owners were able to retain 6 jobs and create 2 jobs.

CSBDF uses iContact software to capture client contact information and sign-in sheets, also capturing contact information for the clients, are collected for each session held. Carolina Small Business has also implemented Salesforce as a software to track every level of interaction with the borrowers. Total implementation of Salesforce and migration from our old system is expected in January 2017. CSBDF conducts semi-annual surveys of our borrowers to verify job creation and retention numbers as well as assessing the impact of CSBDF's loan on both the borrower and their business. CSBDF now reports confirmed jobs created or retained in order to avoid overstating our impact. Results show that our borrowers have created or retained 1,018 jobs in communities across the state from the 458 loans totaling \$32.7 million funded by Carolina Small Business.

CSBDF uses iContact software to capture client contact information and sign-in sheets, also capturing contact information for the clients, are collected for each session held. Carolina Small Business has also implemented Salesforce as a software to track every level of interaction with the borrowers. Total implementation of Salesforce and migration from TEA is expected in January 2017. TEA is software that CSBDF uses to web based software loan system that we use for data management, loan processing system. This platform is used for data extraction to create reports, to measure data outcomes, to assess delinquency and past due accounts, among other uses. Salesforce will take over these functions in a more streamline manner, connecting all individuals in the organization for more efficient data collection.

CSBDF's mission is to foster economic development in underserved communities by providing capital, business services, and policy research to support small businesses. The WWBC's mission is to provide high quality technical assistance and programs that reduce barriers and serve as a catalyst to the success of entrepreneurs, particularly women who are socially and economically disadvantaged, in the Western region of North Carolina. Our proposed project directly impacts our mission statement as the program will provide services to the underserved, prepare them to apply for and employ capital from us and deliver training and technical assistance that will help them sustain their small businesses.

What expertise/accomplishments do you have that are relevant to the proposed project?*

In April 2016, the Western Women's Business Center, a program of Carolina Small Business Development Fund, became an SBA-Affiliated Women's Business Center. For the last 6 years, CSBDF has provided training and technical assistance to small business owners across the state of North Carolina. Each year we have trained approximately 700 people in collaboration with our partners including the Small Business Centers, Small Business Technology Development Centers, SCORE, the WWBC and our event partners. In April 2016, CSBDF launched its own technical assistance program. TSC's technical assistance program aims to assist small business owner at all stages, from completing the loan application process to providing the right resources upon loan closing to help them succeed. TSC will also work with our existing borrowers to help them with any form of technical assistance or training on a range of topics, such as financial management or marketing.

Asheville Area Arts Council is a great source of referrals for the program and brings consulting resources. A-B Tech's Small Business Center has a partnership with us and referral system to help small businesses in the area. We work with OnTrack Financial to provide financial training to workshop attendees and 1-on-1 counseling and coaching. In April 2016, the SBA designated the WWBC as an SBA-affiliated Women's Business Center and was awarded a grant. The grant allows us to expand our services-- training, coaching, workshops and TA-- to existing and aspiring women entrepreneurs in western NC to include low-income communities, people of color, veterans, Latinos & artists. The SBTDCs are another partner.

We work with Goodwill Industries to hold trainings and classes in its facilities. The City of Asheville is a partner for funding for programs done in Asheville. The Women's Wellbeing Foundation is a partner and they are partners with Hillcrest Community – Public housing in Asheville.
