	On January 12. 2023 the WWBC hosted a ribbon-cutting ceremony to celebrate its new office location in the Asheville Mall. The ceremony was attended by more than 40 local small business leaders, entrepreneurs, and public officials. The new location allows the WWBC to be more accessible to small businesses, owners, and entrepreneurs.
	On February 21, 2023, we hosted the African American Business Alliance: Small Business Banking to discuss why are there so many banks. Aren't all banks the same? How to pick the right bank for you. Are credit unions banks? 14 people attended.
