### Financial Burden of Child Care for Working Families

- Infant care costs **75%** of the earnings of a full-time, minimum-wage worker
- Care for 1 child **exceeds** the average cost of in-state **tuition** at public universities in 33 states, including NC
- Care for 2 children **exceeds rent** in over 80% of communities in US

## What delineates Pre-K from child care?

- Focus on school readiness, ensuring children are succeeding in school by 3rd grade
- Targets rising kindergarteners
- Governed by high program standards
- NC pre-K teachers must meet specific certification and licensure requirements





#### Pre-K in NC

- High program standards: 1 of 4 states that meets all 10 National Institute of Early Education Research Benchmarks
- 1:9 staff/child ratio requirement
- Open to 4-year-olds
- Gross family income below 75% of the SMI or documented risk factor





## Community Impact: what does this standard deliver?

- Provides foundational growth in intellectual, social, and emotional development
- Improves school readiness continuity of education
- Investment in our future workforce
- Generates economic returns become tax paying citizens
- Strengthens parents' access to employment

- Economies of scale
- Existing facility capacity
- Transportation
- Number of days provided
- School calendar vs. year round





# Factors to consider: Program designed for At-Risk Children

- Poverty need in an area
- Free and Reduced Lunch
- School performance
- School capacity





## Option 1: Continue Current Preliminary Community Conversation

#### Buncombe County Partnership for Children and Children First/CIS

"Core Team" Meeting to determine if and how to conduct a planning process for collective community-driven approach to Pre-K, March 17

If planning proceeds, will look at ways to ensure *all* children have access to high-quality affordable pre-K (Not "universal pre-K", but weighted toward children in need)

- Convene/engaged broad range of community stakeholders
- Research need and service gaps
- Align/leverage existing services and supports
- Maximize (and supplement) public and private funding
- Develop sustainability plan

#### Option 2: Pilot Pre-K for High-risk, Low-income

<b>\$8,107.71</b> to <b>\$12,985.19</b>	<b>\$11,741.52</b> to <b>\$16,619</b>

#### **Option 3: Universal Implementation**

County-wide Pre-K; School Calendar Option; Estimated \$7,332 to \$10,500 per child annually (based on market rate and national model examples)

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\*Excludes start-up and renovation/upfit costs

## What is the ROI in Pre-K: Community Impact

## \$8 return for every dollar invested
