The Juvenile Crime Prevention Council (JCPC) has studied the risk factors and needs of Juvenile Court involved youth in this county and hereby publishes this Request for Proposals. The JCPC anticipates funds from the NC Department. of Public Safety, Division of Adult Correction and Juvenile Justice, Community Programs section in the amount stated above to fund the program types specified below. Such programs will serve delinquent and at-risk youth for the state fiscal year 2021-2022 beginning on, or after, July 1, 2021. The use of these funds in this county requires a local match in the amount specified above.

The JCPC will consider proposals for the following needed programs:

Priority 1: Restitution/Community Service Priority Priority 5: Interpersonal Skills Priority 9: Tutoring Priority

2: Sex Offender Treatment Priority 3: Priority 6: Runaway Shelter 10: Experiential Skills Teen Court Priority 4: Priority 7: Structured Day

Vocational Skills Priority 4: Priority 7: Structured Priority 8: Mentoring

Proposed program services should target the following risk factors for delinquency or repeat delinquency:

Most Serious Prior Adjudication (prior class 1-3 misdemeanors) (prior class f-1 or a-1 misdemeanors); Prior Assualts (without a weapon); Known Use - Alcohol, Illegal Drugs (prior 12 months); School Behavioral Problems (prior 12 months); Relationship with Peers (Lacks prosocoal peers or sometimes association with deliquent peers.) Parental Supervision

Peer Domain: Peer Relationships

Individual Domain: Alcohol and Illegal Drug Use

Family Domain: Parental Supervision

School Behavior

School Domain: School Behavior/Adjustment

Investing in our Community: More than \$600K in Grant Funding Opportunities for Juvenile Crime Prevention Programs Available Now



The Buncombe County Juvenile Crime Prevention Council (JCPC) is now accepting proposals for fiscal year 2021-2022. The JCPC announces the availability of small grants totaling more than \$600,000 in state funding for local nonprofits and public agencies working to serve delinquent and at-risk youth in our community.

The <u>JCPC (https://www.buncombecounty.org/governing/depts/justice-services/councils-advisory-groups/juvenile-crime-prevention-council.aspx)</u> is seeking innovative projects designed to address the following factors in our community:

School Behavior/Adjustment:

 In Buncombe County there has been a decrease in serious school behavior problems from 54% in 2018-2019 to 50% in 2019-2020. However, that is still an increase from 41% in 2016-2017 and 48% in 2017-2018. Buncombe County is also higher than the state rate of 45% in 2019-2020.

Substance Abuse Within Past 12 Months:

 In Buncombe County, there has been an 8% increase from 26% in 2018-2019 to 34% in 2019-2020.

Abuse/Neglect History:

 In Buncombe County there was a slight increase in victim with support from 22% in 2018-2019 to 23% in 2019-2020.

Mental Health Needs:

 In Buncombe County, the percentage of no mental health care needs indicated increased from 17% in 2018-2019 to 24% in 2019-2020. Mental health care needs addressed increased from 48% in 2018-2019 to 50% in 2019-2020.
