"...will appoint representatives to and fully participate in the new Community Reparations Commission that the City of Asheville is creating"






Role of Project Management Support Team

Project Milestones To-Date

Community Reparations Commission Appointment Process

Twenty-five (25) Community Reparations Commission members

1. Impacted Neighborhood Representatives:

- Thirteen (13) appointments to be selected by neighborhood organizations including:
 - Six (6) neighborhoods historically impacted by Urban Renewal:
 - Burton Street, East End/Valley St., Shiloh, Southside, Stumptown, Heart of Chestnut
 - Public housing communities
- Neighborhood nomination process
- Selection process at the discretion of the neighborhood organizations submitting nominations
- City of Asheville or Buncombe County residents only





Community Reparations Commission Appointment Process (cont'd)

2. Impact Focus Area Appointments:

- Twelve (12) appointments based on experience and expertise in criminal justice, economic development, education, healthcare, and/or housing impact focus areas
 - Six (6) City Council seat appointments. City of Asheville residents only.
 - Six (6) Buncombe County Commissioner seat appointments. Buncombe County residents only.

City of Asheville Reparations Commission Neighborhood Nomination Package

BACKGROUND

On July 14, 2020, the Asheville City Council passed a Resolution Supporting Community Reparations for Black Asheville. The City Council charged the City Manager with establishing a Reparations Commission and a process to develop short-term, medium-term, and long-term recommendations for reparations to redress the harm caused by the City's:

- Participation in and sanctioning of the enslavement of Black people;
- · Enforcement of segregation and its accompanying discriminatory practices; and
- Actions in carrying out an urban renewal program that destroyed multiple, successful Black communities.

The Reparations Commission is tasked with issuing a report in a timely manner for consideration by the City into their respective short and long term priorities and plans. This report and the resulting budgetary and programmatic priorities may include but not be limited to:

- Increasing minority homeownership and access to other affordable housing
- Increasing minority business ownership and career opportunities
- Strategies to grow equity and generational wealth
- Close the gaps in healthcare, education, employment, and pay
- Improve neighborhood safety and fairness within the criminal justice system.

REPARATIONS COMMISSION MEMBERSHIP

The Reparations Commission will be comprised of twenty-five (25) members. Thirteen (13) of the Commission members will be nominated by legacy and other neighborhoods in the City of Asheville most impacted by systemic racism. Sic (6) members will be appointed by the Asheville City Council and six (6) members will be appointed by the Buncombe County Board of Commissioners through a competitive application process.

Neighborhood Organizations/Associations will be naming the members of the Reparations Commission that they wish to serve as their representatives by submitting a nomination form for each representative. The total number of nominees by Neishborhood Organization is listed below:

1. Impacted Neighborhood Nomination Process

There are thirteen (13) seats on the Community Reparations Commission reserved for representatives nominated by impacted neighborhoods. The impacted neighborhoods that will submit the names of their representatives on the Community Reparations Commission are:

- Burton Street
- East End/Valley Street
- Shiloh
- Southside
- Stumptown
- Public Housing Communities

All nominees must be residents of either the City of Asheville or Buncombe County.

If you are interested in being nominated by one of the neighborhood groups listed above, please complete the Neighborhood Candidate Interest Form by clicking here. All completed interest forms will be submitted to the neighborhood group(s) selected for review. The City of Asheville is not involved in the Impacted Neighborhood selection process.

2. Impact Focus Area Application Process

There are twelve (12) seats on the Community Reparations Commission reserved for individuals identified with expertise in one or more of the following impact focus areas:

- Criminal justice
- Economic development
- Healthcare
- Housing

The Asheville City Council will appoint six (6) of the twelve (12) impact focus area seats on the Commission. The Buncombe County Board of Commissioners will appoint the remaining six (6) seats.

All appointees must be residents of either the City of Asheville or Buncombe County.
