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GS §14-234.3

"No public official shall knowingly participate in making or administering a contract, including the award of money in the form of a grant, loan, or other appropriation, with any nonprofit with which that public official is associated. The public official shall record his or her recusal with the clerk to the board, and once recorded, the political subdivision of this State may enter into or administer the contract."

- This applies to all persons elected to serve on political subdivisions of the State where such official is a director, officer, or governing board member of a North Carolina nonprofit.
- A public official in this class must file a recusal with the clerk and may not participate in approving any contract or appropriation for that nonprofit.
- Violation is a Class 1 misdemeanor.

Budget Priorities

Public Safety

\$6.6 million new investments in areas such as inmate medical care and other Sheriff's Office training and supplies, Family Justice Center partners, Training Center equipment and maintenance, and twenty-four (24) new positions

Early Childhood Education Workforce Development

\$3.9 million investment in Pre-K

Homelessness & Continuum of Care

\$698,000 investment in areas such as Homeward Bound funding through VAYA Health, contract for Library-Based Outreach and Coordinated Assessment, Code Purple contract, and two (2) new positions

Infrastructure (Unincorporated. & Growth Areas)

\$437,000 investment in areas such as investment in water quality, master planning partnership, and three (3) new positions

Consolidation of School Systems

Parties agreed to revisit at a later date because of the impending arrival of a new Superintendent for Asheville City Schools and its newly elected board

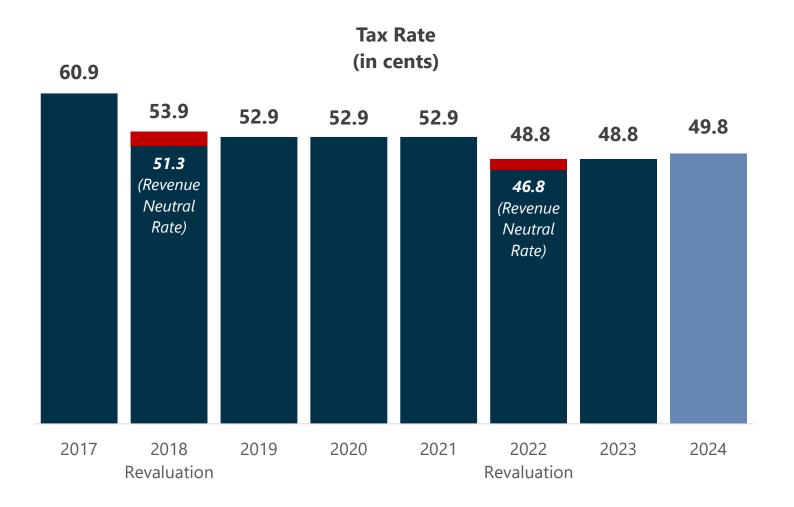

Cost of Living Adjustment

The Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA) is be the 2-year average annual change in the CPI-W, measured as of December 31. The index to be used is the Consumer Price Index for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W), published by the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS). This calculation for FY24 results in an increase of **7.28**%

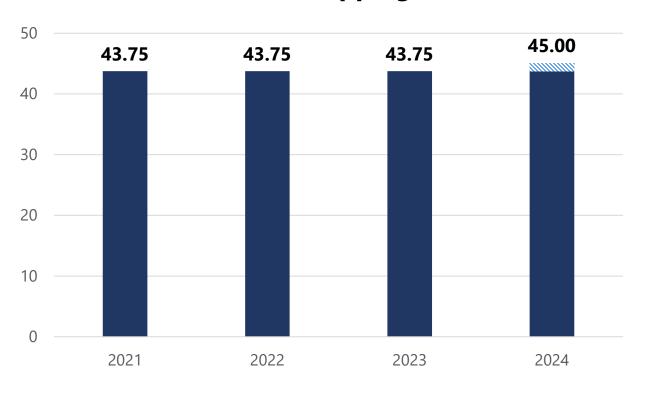
