The Project

Legislative Mandate

"The Buncombe County Board of Education and the Asheville City Board of Education shall jointly study the feasibility of the merger of the Buncombe County School Administrative Unit and the City of Asheville School Administrative Unit, including the potential economic and educational impact of merging the school units and any other relevant information. The Buncombe County Board of Education and the Asheville City Board of Education shall report findings and recommendations to the standing committees of the General Assembly hearing elections matters no later than February 15, 2025."

Prismatic's Conclusions and Recommendation

What Does Research Say?

- Results were split in the Buncombe-specific studies
- Size does matter, but generally only when moving from "tiny" to "small"
- Economies of scale tend to be small
- NC-specific research on consolidation does not show positive changes in academic outcomes and only little cost savings

Would Consolidation Improve Things?

- Comparing ACS and BCS, are the programs/systems/facilities equitable?
- Would there be financial, operational, or equity benefits to consolidation in this area?
- +some more specific questions in each area

Would Consolidation Improve Things?

- Neither ACS nor BCS is far outpacing the other or state averages on EOCs, EOGs, or graduation rates.
- Both ACS and BCS are struggling with achievement gaps.
- Prismatic found ACS and BCS to NOT be overstaffed in their central offices.
- Consolidation would require a consistent approach to salaries and supplements.

Projected Growth in Buncombe County Population by 2050



Roughly, this means 115 new students per year through 2050, countywide.

Conclusions

- Neither ACS nor BCS is in a financial or other crisis.
- No compelling evidence consolidation would improve student performance.
- No compelling evidence consolidation would substantially reduce costs.
- Little current collaboration between ACS and BCS.
- Strong local perceptions of "culture" differences that would need to be overcome in consolidation.
- Little local support for consolidation.

Recommendation

Prismatic does not recommend consolidation of ACS and BCS.
