

- Voluntary agreement
- Limits certain development
- Permanent protection of land and views
- Continued ownership
- Each partnership is unique
- May lower estate taxes
- May lower income taxes


The Value of a Conservation Easement

Market Value (without easement): \$1,000,000

Easement Value: - \$700,000

Market Value (with easement): \$300,000









- Leveraged funds \$24,240,466


