Project Description	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> To promote public safety and deter young people from joining gangs, the proposed project will establish an evidence-based gang prevention education program targeting 4th and 5th grade students in neighborhoods known for high rates of criminal activity. In its pilot year, the curriculum would be delivered in partnership with one elementary school (Isaac Dickson Elementary) and one public housing community (Pisgah View), reaching an estimated 300 students.

Organization Description*

Launched in 2016, the Gateway Group of Asheville (GGA) provides resources, programs, and services for effective and healthy parenting, marriages, and relationships for families and individuals. Currently, the organization conducts two parenting programs based on curricula from the National Fatherhood Initiative, with many clients being referred through Buncombe County Health and Human Services and Buncombe County Child Support Services. More than 155 men have successfully completed Gateway Buncombe National Fatherhood Initiative Program, with a reunification rate of 86%. The Healthy Parenting & Co-Parenting Motherhood Program, which helps mothers improve the relationships they have with fathers for the benefit of their children, has reached 75 participants to date and has a reunification rate of 88%.

Project Description

What do you propose to do? What is your plan? What are your goals?

According to a 2018 North Carolina GangNET report, based on a law enforcement database tracking gang activity, there are between 1 and 5 documented gangs in Buncombe County. It also reports that 78% of NC gang members are African-American, a disproportionate number that is likely “the result of socioeconomic variables... emphasis[ing] the need for gang prevention programs.” In July 2018, multiple Asheville news outlets reported that city crime rates had already doubled from the previous year, particularly in public housing neighborhoods. To promote public safety and deter young people from joining gangs, the proposed project will establish an evidence-based gang prevention education program targeting 4th and 5th grade students in neighborhoods known for high rates of criminal activity. In its pilot year, the curriculum would be delivered in partnership with one elementary school (Isaac Dickson Elementary) and one public housing community (Pisgah View), reaching an estimated 300 students.

Key Steps*

How will the project work? What are specific activities and milestones that your project entails?

The Gang Alternatives Program (GAP) curriculum is delivered in school settings via (8) 45-60 minute lessons over a 2-month period, meeting weekly during health class as part of the school’s safety plan. In community or after-school settings, the program is delivered in a series of (12) 60-90 minute lessons.

The following timeline outlines one-year project activities beginning July 1, 2019:

- July 31, 2019: Facilitators and volunteer advisory board members recruited and hired
- August 31, 2019: Agreements with target sites formalized, and facilitator training with Gangfree Life Academy completed
- September 30, 2019: Gang Alternatives Program delivery begins
- December 31, 2019: Gang Alternatives Program delivery complete
- January 31, 2020: Results analyzed and reported; expansion planning and fundraising begins
- June 30, 2020: Target sites for 2020-2021 planned and agreements formalized

Two areas within Asheville City will be the focus of the project in its first year. Specifically, pilot locations chosen for the program include the Pisgah View community center, a neighborhood of 256 apartment units operated by the Housing Authority of the City of Asheville, and Isaac Dickson Elementary School. Isaac Dickson was chosen in part due to its close proximity to the Hillcrest community (within 1 mile) and Pisgah View (within 3 miles). Both pilot sites are located in Commissioner District 1. Replication is planned for other public housing communities and elementary schools throughout Asheville City in future years.

People Served*

Who are the members of our community this project will serve? How many people will be served? Include demographics, including age, area median income, race, neighborhood and/or school.

The project will benefit Asheville City, which has an estimated population of 91,901, with 82.9% being White/Caucasian (including 5.9% of Hispanic ethnicity), 12% African-American, 2% Asian, 2.4% two or more races, and 0.3% American Indian or Alaska Native. Median household income in Asheville is \$46,464. The GAP curriculum will be delivered to approximately 300 4th and 5th grade students in Asheville City, with approximately 187 of these being students at Isaac Dickson Elementary, a Title I school with 36.63% eligible for free and reduced lunch. With a total enrollment of 543, the school is demographically 70% White/Caucasian (including 8% of Hispanic ethnicity), 20% African-American, 8% two or more races, and 2% Asian, Native Hawaiian, or Pacific Islander. The remaining GAP students will meet in the community center in Pisgah View, a neighborhood whose population is approximately 40% African-American, with a median income of \$31,698, and a median age of 26.5.

Partners*

GGA will implement this program in partnership with the Pisgah View community and Isaac Dickson Elementary School. The following individuals have been working with GGA to plan the pilot project:

- Dr. Douglas L. Semark, director of Gangfree Life Academy and founder of the Gang Alternatives Program (GAP), will provide training for facilitators and supply curriculum resources.
- Mr. Gene Bell, CEO of the Asheville Housing Authority and leader of CHOSEN (a group of African-American men who volunteer in the community) will help to coordinate delivery of the program at the pilot community site, Pisgah View.
- Dr. Eric Howard, Director of Student Support Services for Asheville City Schools, manages school safety and will help to coordinate delivery of the program at Isaac Dickson Elementary.
- Support for the program has been expressed by Cpt. Gary Gudac, Lt. Sean Aardema and Lt. Jonathan Brown from the Asheville Police Department, as well as Buncombe County Sheriff Quentin Miller.

Personnel*

Ronald Gates, President and Executive Director of Gateway Group of Asheville, will serve as the Project Director. Gates was certified as a Gang Free Academy facilitator in 2016 and will be responsible for recruiting the facilitators and board members to launch the Gang Alternatives Program in Asheville. Pastor and co-founder of Greater Works Church of God in Christ since 2007, Gates is also a certified pastoral counselor and recovery coach, formerly served as a case manager for a men's homeless shelter and veteran support organization, and currently operates the Gateway Buncombe National Fatherhood Initiative Program. As an

African-American man, his leadership reflects the population of the community to be served, and he will ensure that the facilitators and advisory board members recruited to the program are also representative of the community served.

Success*

GGA proposes to achieve the following:

- Hire and train three part-time facilitators and recruit an advisory board
- Conduct the Gang Alternatives Program at one school and one community site
- Serve approximately 300 4th and 5th grade students in the 2019-2020 school year
- Improve student attitudes and understanding of gang behavior, consequences of joining gangs, and strategies for staying away from gangs, as demonstrated through pre- and post-testing

Data from an external research study of the Gang Alternatives Program in Los Angeles showed that 69% of students had significantly improved attitudes toward gangs and gang-related behavior; 87% had significantly increased understanding about the consequences of joining a gang; 96% were able to apply what they learned; and 90% knew more about strategies to stay away from gangs. Similar success is anticipated for the Asheville pilot and will inform replication, with a goal of expanding to 4 additional sites for a total of 6 next year.

Once successful pilot data has been obtained, the Gateway Group of Asheville and the advisory board for the Gang Alternatives Program will seek additional community and foundation support to replicate the program at additional sites. This will include holding fundraising events within the communities, and submitting grant proposals to area community and regional foundations as well as the North Carolina Governor's Crime Commission.
