Organization*

Tell us about your organization. What is your mission? Highlight two or three key facts and accomplishments that best define your organization.

In 2018 a group of concerned citizens decided to take on the responsibility of impacting 101 of the most at risk youth in Buncombe County. Since that time we have partnered with several youth organizations, Asheville City Schools, Buncombe County Schools, The Asheville Housing Authority, Buncombe County

Sheriffs Department, Asheville Police Department, and several other community organizations. The group started with 5 African American Men and now has over 80 men and women of all races that are committed to impacting our youth in a positive way. The group is called CHOSEN. Our mission is to make sure every child knows, that "They are LOVED" and "They are CHOSEN". Over the last two years we have sent 244 kids and 18 adults to KAA Camp, had 191 kids and 33 adults attend the impact retreats, impacted 625 people during the Annual Giving Junction/Be the Change Festival. Chosen Members each week visit a different city or county school and do morning greetings to encourage the kids and staff. We have mentors that meet with kids that are experiencing difficulties in the classroom each week at two elementary schools. We have members that attend lunch every Tuesday at Asheville Middle School, we also have members that facilitate a weekly meeting with a group of African American teenage boys at Asheville High School that are dealing with the challenges of trying to survive in a community with so much violence and gang activity.

Need for the Project*

What is the main issue this project is established to address? What data or qualitative factors/stories are available to show that need?

The goal is to engage kids throughout the county with safe activities in a loving environment that can foster growth and build self esteem. Kids that are from low income areas throughout the county have fewer opportunities in the summer and even weekends to engage in activities that will help them grow. We believe that ever child has the promise of greatness and it will take a loving community to bring that out. We have seen a increase of violence among youth in our community. Schools are asking for help in dealing with children that are living in harsh environments. At the Rescue Mission we have seen an 60% increase in women and children seeking safe shelter. These kids vary in age range, race and sex but they all come from low income areas that have a high rate of violence.

Project*

We are committed to creating new ways to impact the most at risk kids in our county. We believe that if we are consistent in showing and telling kids that they Matter, that they are Loved and they are Chosen, will we build relationships and gain trust. Once relationships have been established, respect comes next, then the kids are open to hear our voice. We believe in helping them combat all the negative things in their environment. 46% percentage of the more than 50,000 children in Buncombe County, lived in poor to low income homes. We know that children that experience poverty are more likely to have lower test score in school, they are at a higher rate of dropout, they miss more school time for various reasons. A large percentage are from a fatherless home. They have a higher percentage of being involved in a serious crime. We believe that our work will impacts families to have hope and believe again. We are committed to stepping into the hard places and just show up when needed.

People Served*

Each year the number of people impacted by our efforts grow. We are projecting that we will add another 100 kids representing 60 plus families to our camp outreach. We expect to continue the relationships with over 400 people with our festivals. Last year we had kids from all over Buncombe County. We had kids from 9 City Schools and 22 Buncombe County Schools. Kids range in age from 8-18 and we served families of all

races. We had White, African American and Hispanic kids attend camp and the retreats. It was beautiful to see the friendships that developed and watch kids just be kids.

Results*

We believe that this project can save lives by engage our kids in activities that are safe and encourage hope for the future. We have seen great results from our past outreaches and events so we want to continue on with that momentum. We think with the Buncombe County Schools partnership we ill be able to do a summer festival in the county and with the Asheville City Schools partnership we will do another festival in December we think we can impact thousands of people in a positive way. We know that we will continue to support the Buncombe County Sheriffs SROs Ontrack program with volunteers and resources.

Evaluation*

We continue to see success everyday when one of our members attend a meeting at a school, and the kids are excited to know that someone cares. We are welcomed in the classrooms and parents feel like they are being supported. Our numbers continue to increase, because of the diverse group within our membership. We are able to help problem solve for families. We have been able to help with locating employment for families. Finding tutors for kids, support families with food boxes and clothing. We currently keep track of all the outreach efforts using a google forms. We have entire family contact information, school, needs, goals and activities. We have 400 + kids in our system. Again we measure our success in our ability to continue to outreach to families and encourage kids to be great.

United Way - Helped with some of the festivals expenses and they created a fun zone for the kids Asheville City Schools - provided a facility to host the December Festival.

Buncombe County Schools - hosted a kids assembly for the artist and served as the collection point for agency funds for the festival

Asheville Police Department - Provided funds and security for the festival

Asheville Housing Authority - provided a meeting space for the bi monthly meeting, funds for the festival, transportation for the impact retreat. Activity space on Saturdays for kids activities Buncombe County Sheriffs Department - SRO's went on the KAA Trip with kids from the county schools and was adult leaders at the retreat. They provided financial support for the second camp trip to KAA and support for the Dec festival.

Western Carolina Rescue Ministry - Covered the food vendors at the festival for 400 guest, snacks and hygiene kits for the kids going to KAA, Insurance for all activities and events, financial Stewardship of grant and funds.

Appalachian Mountain Community Health Center - Provided a grant for the Impact retreat, banquet celebrating kids and families involved in Chosen outreach events.

We are excited about continuing these partnerships and bring more community stakeholders to the table to increase the impact.

We have built a relationships within the community and we continue to enlist more willing volunteers to give time and create opportunities for all the kids that are in need in our area. We are committed to mentoring in the schools and trying to be visible as much as possible. We realize the need is so large and that at some point we will have to have a director of this program in order to advance the vision and impact more children and we are discussing what that would look like for the future.

If the project only receive a partial grant, we will have to reduce the number of children we engage with, we will continue to fundraise for the fall and summer events and possible change the format or length of our camps.

Resource Support

Beyond this grant request, how can Buncombe County support your organization with this project and in strengthening your work?

In December of 2019, we hosted a community event that featured Grammy award artist SaulPaul. The Be The Change Festivals was attended by over 400 people with 300 + being kids from both the City and County schools. We had 10 activity zones with different branches of the county government providing interactive activities for kids at three of the zones. This collaboration was wonderful and the ability for environmental services, county library, health and human services, MacArthur Foundation social justice initiatives, and The Sheriffs Department to be able to interact with the community in a way that was fun and exciting was great. We plan on having two of these types of impact festivals in 2020-2021. We look for ways to leverage our influence in the community with our relationships with city and county governments and social service organizations.

Other

Our hope this year is to create a leadership academy. We desire to identify leaders within each community, and invest in developing them into strong advocates for a better future. We may send some to KAA Higher Ground leadership camp in July if we have the funding support and/or create leadership camps and training here over the summer using mentors and leaders that will invest in their growth.

Dear Sir or Madam:

This letter is in response to your request for a copy of your organization's determination letter. This letter will take the place of the copy you requested.

Our records indicate that a determination letter issued in July 1980 granted your organization exemption from federal income tax under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. That letter is still in effect.

Based on information subsequently submitted, we classified your organization as one that is not a private foundation within the meaning of section 509(a) of the Code because it is an organization described in section 509(a)(1) and 170(b)(1)(A)(vi).

This classification was based on the assumption that your organization's operations would continue as stated in the application. If your organization's sources of support, or its character, method of operations, or purposes have changed, please let us know so we can consider the effect of the change on the exempt status and foundation status of your organization.

Your organization is required to file Form 990, Return of Organization Exempt from Income Tax, only if its gross receipts each year are normally more than \$25,000. If a return is required, it must be filed by the 15th day of the fifth month after the end of the organization's annual accounting period. The law imposes a penalty of \$20 a day, up to a maximum of \$10,000, when a return is filed late, unless there is reasonable cause for the delay.

All exempt organizations (unless specifically excluded) are liable for taxes under the Federal Insurance Contributions Act (social security taxes) on remuneration of \$100 or more paid to each employee during a calendar year. Your organization is not liable for the tax imposed under the Federal Unemployment Tax Act (FUTA).
