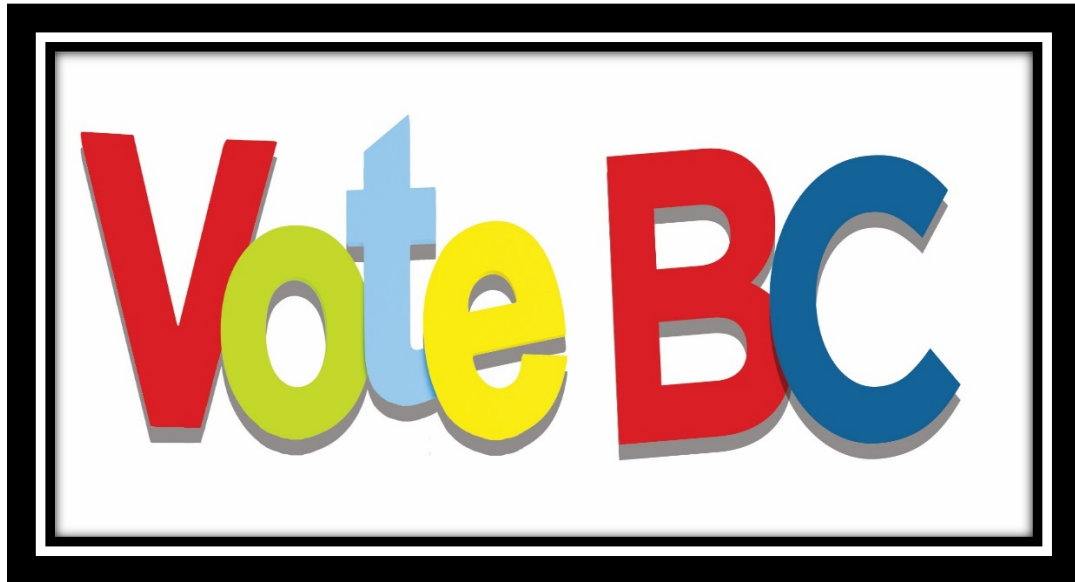

Dear Candidates, Political Party Chairs, and Media Representatives:

This booklet contains important information for the 2018 General Elections. We encourage you to become familiar with the information and to use it as a reference throughout the Election season. **Please share this information with your assistants and campaign workers who will be responsible for the implementation of election plans and tasks.** Included are descriptive definitions of Election terminology as well as general statutes of election law. Visit our website at Buncombecounty.org/vote to view voter statistics as well as precinct and district maps.

New for this Election:

- 1. HB 496: “The order in which candidates shall appear on official ballots in any election ballot item shall be either alphabetical order or reverse alphabetical order by the last name of the candidate, which order shall be determined each election by drawing at the State Board of Elections and Ethics Enforcement after the closing of the filing period for all offices on the ballot.” The ballot order for this election will be in alphabetical order beginning with the letter “F.”**
- 2. Three Election Day voting locations have been changed. These are highlighted on the enclosed Election Day voting location list.**
- 3. Please alert your volunteers to respect those voting locations that do not allow signs and the distribution of candidate specific material.**
- 4. Constitutional Amendment information can be found on the Election Services website.**
- 5. The Libertarian, Green and Constitution Parties are now recognized political parties in North Carolina.**
- 6. The Early Voting hours have changed. See enclosed information.**
- 7. In addition to the Early Voting Wait Map, there will now be an Election Day Wait Count section on the Election Services website. Voters who are voting on Election Day can check the website to see how many voters are in line at their Election Day voting location. Please help us get the word out about these services.**

The schedule for Election Board meetings has also been provided. All Election Board meetings are open to the public, and candidates, their representatives, and interested citizens are welcome to attend. Sample Ballots are available online for voters to print at home.

The Buncombe County Board of Elections and its staff are available for questions. Please do not hesitate to call.

Definitions

- ❖ **Electioneering:** Loitering, congregating, distributing campaign material, or otherwise campaigning.
- ❖ **Buffer Zone:** Required 50-foot area in all directions from the entrance to a voting place in which there can be no electioneering or media presence.
- ❖ **Voting Place:** The designated area that is not more than 100 feet from the voting machines or ballot box. If the voting place is a room or building with an area greater than 100 feet the area will be marked off by rope or other practical means.
- ❖ **Voting Enclosure:** An area inside the voting place. A voting enclosure is the area which contains the precinct officials, tables, voting equipment, voting booths, registration books, poll books, help station, all election related materials, and spaces for qualified observers are located. In the event of a small voting place, the voting enclosure may also serve as the voting place.
- ❖ **Precinct:** Geographically designated area that defines the polling place assignments for all voters who reside within the boundaries.
- ❖ **Ballot Style:** Individual ballot issued to a voter and assigned by residential address. Due to many combinations of jurisdictions, multiple ballot styles may be used in a single polling place.
- ❖ **Provisional Ballot:** Process whereby people whose eligibility to vote cannot be immediately determined are allowed to vote a ballot that is sealed inside an envelope until the Board of Elections staff researches the voter's information to determine eligibility.
- ❖ **Inactive Voter:** Status of a voter from whom official mailings have been returned to the Board of Elections.
- ❖ **Automark:** A supplemental touchscreen tool with audio capability that if needed, voters may choose to use which assists the voter in completing the ballot. Automarks are available in every polling place and Early Voting site.
- ❖ **DS 200 Scanner:** Optical ballot scanning unit.
- ❖ **VBT Scanner:** Hand held barcode scanner unit used ONLY to ensure that the ballot issued matches the ballot assigned to the voter.

- ❖ **Curbside Voting:** A designated parking area available at every voting location for voters unable to enter the voting enclosure due to physical limitations.

Campaign Signs

General Election Statutes pertaining to the regulation, placement, and removal of campaign signs may be read in its entirety on our website: www.buncombecounty.org/vote.

In respect for the facilities who serve the community as Polling Places for Early Voting or on Election Day itself, campaign signs should be removed on the last day of Early Voting and on Election night after the polls close.

Media Rules for All Voting Places

- Members of the media have a First Amendment right to report on matters of public interest, including elections.
- Members of the media must conduct media polls and interviews **outside** of the 50-foot buffer zone.
- Precinct Officials may provide the number of persons who have voted to the media. Precinct Officials **may not** leave the voting place to provide this information.
- Members of the media may take a panoramic photograph or video of the voting place, but are not permitted to use a zoom lens or device that could show an individual voter in the process.
- Members of the media should be positioned so they will not interfere with, obstruct, or disrupt the voting process. Media are not allowed inside the voting enclosure unless they are there to vote or present themselves as a provisional voter.
- **The permission of the Chief Judge and the voter are required for the taking of any picture, video, or other recorded image of a voter inside the voting enclosure.**

Using a Cell Phone in a Voting Enclosure

Cell phone use is **prohibited** in the voting enclosure with the exception of use as a notepad containing notes that were made previously to entering the voting enclosure. It is **ILLEGAL** to record a voted ballot or to communicate via an electronic device while voting.

Rules Regarding Media Interviews and Photography/Video

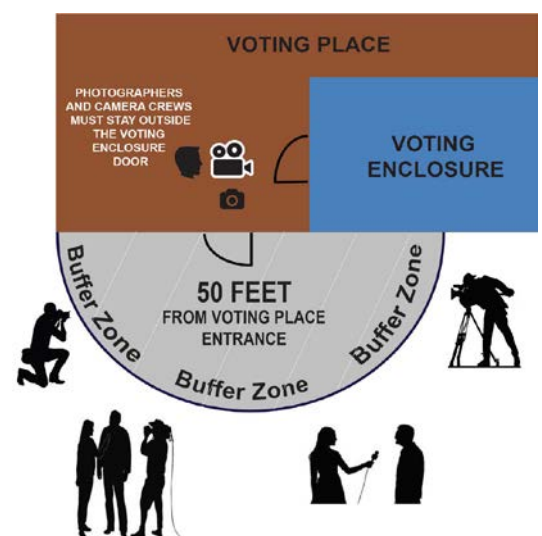
North Carolina General Statute 163A-1134 limits activity within the electioneering buffer zone that may “hinder access, harass others...” These 50 foot buffer zones are set off at polling places and early voting locations, are clearly noticeable, and apply to media.

Also, North Carolina General Statute 163A-1133 limits media access in the voting enclosure as follows:

(b) **Photographing Voters Prohibited.** - No person shall photograph, videotape, or otherwise record the image of any voter within the voting enclosure, except with the permission of both the voter and the chief judge of the precinct. If the voter is a candidate, only the permission of the voter is required. This subsection shall also apply to one-stop sites under G.S. 163A-1300, 163A-1301, 163A-1302, 163A-1303, and 163A-1304. This subsection does not apply to cameras used as a regular part of the security of the facility that is a voting place or one-stop site.

(c) **Photographing Voted Ballot Prohibited.** - No person shall photograph, videotape, or otherwise record the image of a voted official ballot for any purpose not otherwise permitted under law.

- Members of the media must conduct media polls and interviews outside the buffer zone.
- Members of the media must identify themselves to the Chief Judge when entering the buffer zone.
- Photographing voters is restricted. No person (including media, other voters, or parents) shall photograph, videotape, or otherwise record the image of any voter within the voting enclosure, except with the permission of both the voter and the Chief Judge of the precinct. If a candidate is in the act of voting in his/her precinct, only the permission of the candidate is required.



- With the cooperation of the Chief Judge, members of the media may take a panoramic photograph or video of the voting place, but are not permitted to use a zoom lens that could show the individual voter in the process of voting.
- Members of the media should be positioned so that they will not obstruct or disrupt the voting process.
- After the polls close and all voters have left the enclosure, the media and public are allowed inside the enclosure but may not hinder the operations of the Precinct Officials.

Requirements for **Certain (Not all) First-Time Voters**

Under the Help America Vote Act (HAVA), individuals who 1) have registered to vote 2) have not previously voted in an election and 3) have not provided verifiable ID, must show one of the following types of ID to an election official the first time they present to vote. (GS 163-166.12)

Same Day Registration voters will be asked to provide one of the following documents. Documents must be current (either the most recent or at a minimum dated within three (3) months of the time it is presented to an election official). The HAVA document must have the voters name and current address.

Current Name and Address Document

- Utility bill; telephone; mobile phone; electric or gas; cable television; water or sewage
- Bank statement or bank issued credit card statement
- Government paycheck, invoice, letter. Or any other document from a local, state, or U.S. government agency
- Property tax bill
- License to hunt, fish, own a gun etc.
- Automotive registration
- Public housing or Social Service Agency document
- Paycheck or paycheck stub from an employer or W-2 statement
- Birth Certificate

Additional Identification Options (with current Name and Address)

- NC driver license or NC identification card
- US Military ID
- U.S. Passport
- Other government-issued photo ID
- Student photo ID
- Certified Naturalization Document

If a first-time voter cannot show one of the forms of acceptable ID they may still vote by casting a provisional ballot. They will need to send or bring one of the forms of ID noted above to the county board of elections no later than the close of business on the ninth day after Election Day.

What is a Current Document? To be current, the document must be the most recent version or at least dated within **three (3) months** of the date it is presented to an election official. Copies of acceptable documents are permissible. The original is not required. It is also permissible for a voter to present an electronic or online version of a document, as long as the document is obtained from the original source (e.g., e-bills from utility companies, electronic bank statements, electronic earnings statement from an employer, etc.) and shows his or her current name and address.

Absentee Voting

Absentee Requests:

- State law requires all absentee ballot requests to be made on the State Absentee Ballot Request Form. This form can be found and printed from the BOE website, www.buncombecounty.org/vote or the State BOE website, www.ncsbe.gov.
- Absentee requests must be signed by the voter or near relative (spouse, brother, sister, parent, grandparent, child, grandchild, mother-in-law, father-in-law, daughter-in-law, son-in-law, step parent, stepchild, or verifiable legal guardian. **Power of Attorney is NOT granted the ability to request an absentee ballot.**
- Absentee requests may be returned by mail, faxed, or emailed to the Board of Elections.
- It is unlawful for any owner, manager, director, employee, or anyone other than a near relative or guardian to request an absentee ballot or serve as a witness on the

return ballot envelope for a resident in a hospital, clinic, assisted living, or skilled care nursing home.

- A new request must be submitted for each election. Exception: Voters with a medical impediment(s) may check a box on the ballot return envelope (when voting in a Primary) to receive a ballot for all elections in the same calendar year. A new request is required for each calendar year.

Absentee Ballot Return:

- Completed absentee ballots MAY NOT be returned to a precinct on Election Day.
- Completed absentee ballots MAY be accepted at any Early Voting site.
- Voters who decide to either vote early or vote on Election Day, after requesting an absentee ballot should destroy the absentee ballot they received.
- Absentee ballots require the signature of **one notary public** or **two witnesses** complete with the address of the witnesses.
- A witness is attesting that the absentee ballot was completed by the voter and the voter has put the ballot in the return envelope.
- Completed absentee ballots **MUST** be returned to the BOE office by 5:00 PM on Election Day or postmarked by Election Day and received three days after the election.
- “Best Practice is to ask the postal clerk for a hand-stamped postmark when returning an absentee ballot to verify time and date the ballot was mailed.
- Direct questions about military and overseas voting to the BOE office.

Buncombe County Early Voting Program

- There will be eleven (11) Early Voting sites utilized for the November Election. For specific locations and times of the Early Voting sites refer to page four (4) of this booklet. For this and other valuable information, please visit www.buncombecounty.org/vote.

- Early Voting will begin on October 17, 2018 at 7:00 AM and end on November 3rd, 2018 at 1:00 PM. Voters must be in line by exactly 1:00 PM to vote early on November 3rd, 2018. Same Day Registration voters **MUST** bring a document with their name and current address dated within three (3) months of the election. Please see the first-time voters page for a complete list of acceptable HAVA documents for registration.
- Same Day Registration **WILL** be available at all Early Voting sites during the early voting period. Same Day Registration is **NOT** available on Election Day, November 6th, 2018.
- All eligible voters in Buncombe County may vote at any Early Voting site.
- Buffer Zones and electioneering regulations will be in effect at all early voting and Election Day locations.
- If you are planning a group-voting event at any Early Voting site, if possible, please inform the Buncombe County Board of Elections in advance. Additional preparation such as increased staffing or supplies may be required to service the voters. Examples of events would include voter busses and organized marches to the polls.
- **An online wait map application will be located on the Buncombe County Election Services website. This service application is available for voters to use when deciding when to vote during the early voting period. This web application can be accessed from the Buncombe County Election Services website. Look for the “What’s The Wait” button. Voters will be able to view current number of voters in line.**
- **NEW TO THE ELECTION TOOLBOX for Buncombe elections will be an online wait list application that will be available for voters to use when deciding when to vote on Election Day. This web application can be accessed from the Buncombe County Election Services website. Visit buncombecounty.org/vote and click “**View Election Day Wait Count**” button. Voters will be able to view current number of voters in line on Election Day!**

On Election Day

On Election Day, only voters in the act of voting, law enforcement officers, Election Officials, or a person selected by a voter to provide assistance may be inside the voting enclosure. Other than those persons listed above, no person or group of persons may be present within the voting place, voting enclosure, or within the 50-foot buffer zone in any direction from the entrance to the building in which the voting place is located.

- The 50-foot buffer zone prohibition applies to candidates, party officials, and party precinct officials, just as it applies to other members of the public.
- Any exception to the 50' buffer zone will be posted at the Board of Elections Office, 77 McDowell Street, 30 days before the election. The notice will be posted 10 days prior to the beginning of Early Voting and will contain the following information: door from which the buffer zone is measured, distance the buffer zone extends from the door and other necessary information concerning allowed buffer zone activity. Questions or concerns, may be directed to the Board of Elections.
- Members of the public may not interfere with the progress of the election officials. Questions or concerns may be directed to the Board of Election office.
- Chief Judges and Judges of the election will enforce peace and good order at all voting locations during times of voting, as provided in GS 163-48. In the discharge of duties prescribed, the Chief Judge and Judges may call upon the sheriff, the police, or other peace officers to aid them in enforcing the law. They may order the arrest of any person violating any provision of the election laws.
- **Voter turnout information will be available at 10:30 am, 2:30 pm, and 4:30 pm. Campaigners are not allowed in the precinct in an effort to obtain this information.** You may contact the BOE office for this information, **or you can find it on the Election Services website.** Observers and runners are entitled to lists of voters at specific times. The Buncombe County Board of Elections will provide instruction or guidelines to county party chairs to assist with this practice.

Election Ready Facts

- Voters may visit www.buncombecounty.org/vote for information on their registration, voting districts, location of Early Voting sites, dates and times of scheduled Board meetings and other election related materials.
- The BOE telephone system is equipped to provide voters with their registration information as well as directions to their precinct. By calling 250-4200 any day, 24 hours a day, voters can verify their information. The caller will be asked to enter their date of birth and house number.
- Same Day Registration will be available at all Early Voting Sites. Voters need to provide a document from the Help America Vote Act of 2002 (HAVA) list at time of registration. A list of these documents is available in this guide or from the NC State Board of Elections at www.ncsbe.gov.



Looking Up Your Sample Ballot Online

- Step 1** <https://www.buncombecounty.org/vote>
- Step 2** Click the **VOTER REGISTRATION** tab, select MY VOTER INFORMATION
- Step 3** **Type your first AND last names** as they appear on your voter registration record. You do not have to enter a middle name.
- Step 4** Tap **“Enter”** or Click **“Search”**.
- Step 5** Click on **your name** to see a profile of your registration information.
- Step 6** Under **“SAMPLE BALLOTS,”** select the letter/number (i.e. G001), that corresponds to the upcoming election.
- Step 7** **Search, study, and be ready to vote!**

Getting Election Results!

- Downloading results and counting ballots are performed by Election Officials ONLY. All other persons, including members of the public, party representatives, candidates, and candidate representatives are prohibited from this task. No one is to interfere in any way with the downloading of results and the counting of ballots.
- One final tally sheet will be posted for public viewing at each voting place. Workers may not hand out or otherwise make copies of printed precinct tally results.
- Beginning at 7:45 PM on Election Day, election results will begin to be posted approximately every 15 minutes on www.buncombecounty.org as they are available.
- All campaign signs MUST be removed from voting sites after the polls close on Election Day. This is vital to maintaining good relationships with the facilities who provide a voting location to the voters in Buncombe County.
- To get the quickest UNOFFICIAL election results on Election Night visit our website, www.buncombecounty.org/vote. Results will not be finalized or official until after canvass is completed.
- **THE OFFICIAL CANVASS WILL BE CONDUCTED ON November 16th at 11:00 a.m.**

General Statute 163A-1106:

(b) Document Resembling an Official Ballot to contain Disclaimer.—No person other than a board of elections shall produce or disseminate a document substantially resembling an official ballot unless the document contains on its face a prominent statement that the document was not produced by a board of elections and is not an official ballot.”

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
