
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
What is Buncombe County's Role? Appoint members to the Homelessness Initiative Advisory Council (HIAC) One (1) County staff member is appointed to serve Provide \$32,000 in funding annually for City staff supporting to HIAC and its goals Oversee County funded contracts and grants FY22 Funding for Homelessness (Regularly Recurring)* Amount **County Funding** City Staff Supporting HIAC \$32,000 Code Purple \$40,000 Homeward Bound: Library Outreach Homeward Bound: Case Management \$450,000 Total \$572,526 *AHSP funds may be used to address homelessness and housing needs. How is Homelessness Defined?

- Literal Homelessness: Lacking a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence (emergency shelter, transitional housing, or places not meant for human habitation)
- Chronic Homelessness: 12 months of *literal homelessness*, either consecutively or during at least 4 episodes in the past 3 years <u>and</u> having a disability (chronic physical illness or disability, developmental disability, serious mental illness, diagnosable substance use disorder)
- McKinney-Vento Homeless Children and Youth: Literal homeless or sharing housing of other persons due to loss of housing, economic hardship, or a similar reason; data collected/used by school district
- Unsheltered/Unhoused: Lacking shelter/housing


What is a Continuum of Care (CoC)? Continuum of Care (CoC): HUD-defined area within which lead entity Measures inflow/outflow and efficacy

- Quantifies need and identifies specific subpopulations
- Analyzes for duplications and gaps
- Develops and implements strategy
- Continuum of Care (CoC) Lead Entity Must:
 - Coordinate implementation of a housing and service system that meets needs of people experiencing homelessness
 - Provide annual reporting (PIT, System Performance Measures, Longitudinal Systems Analysis)
 - Collect and evaluate data (Homeless Management Information System (HMIS))
 - Serve as collaborative applicant for annual funding applications

What is the Homeless Management Information System (HMIS)?

- Database that tracks who is homeless, including:
 - Demographic and household characteristics, and
 - How homeless individuals interact with services
- Depend on service providers to participate (required for HUD-funded programs, encouraged for all)
- City manages training, licensure, reporting, and technical support
- Annual HUD reporting must be generated through HMIS; directly informs amount of federal funding available to CoC for homeless programs

Goal: Comprehensive data to maximize opportunities for federal resources and to best inform strategy and decision making
